Like all the other branches in the San Antonio Public Library system, the Brook Hollow Branch closed its doors to the public on Saturday, March 14. At this writing, the latest information indicates that the closure will last through Sunday, April 19. The Brook Hollow Friends had planned to hold its quarterly meeting on Saturday, April 4, and its Staff Appreciation Dinner on Tuesday, April 7. Both of those functions have been postponed to a future (undetermined) date.

Long-time Friend **Bruce Gill** passed away on Friday, March 13, following a battle with pancreatic cancer. Bruce was a past-president of the Brook Hollow Friends and rarely missed a book sale or appreciation dinner. He also volunteered at the BookCellar and served as a member of the FOSAPL Board for many years. Bruce was a great Friend to Brook Hollow and will be missed by all who knew him.

The Library system’s closure of its various branches occurred just 6 weeks after the last *SAP-Lings* was published. I’m not aware of any special events happening at Brook Hollow during that period of time that involved Brook Hollow Friends’ funds or involvement.

## From the Library Director



Dear Friends,

I want to thank you for your support and partnership as we navigate through a challenging time for our community and world. As you know, the San Antonio Public Library (SAPL) is experiencing extended closures as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The closure of Library locations

has been necessitated for the protection of the health and safety of our public, staff, and library supporters such as you.

During this temporary closure, we will continue to focus on the marketing of our digital resources. As of early April, digital collection usage was up by 27% percent and to respond to demand, we have purchased additional titles. We currently have 230,000 items in the digital collection, a number that is growing by the day.

FOSAPL has been an essential partner in sharing Library messages throughout this period of time, which has been a great help in reaching all corners of the community.

In addition to promoting our digital resources, SAPL has been expanding its online offerings, including virtual programs. I anticipate that our virtual programming and resources will continue to evolve should closures continue. As of April, SAPL continues to inform the community of the digital resources available at the Library; we have also organized a special LibGuide called "SAPL is Here for You!" with a compilation of resources for all age groups. This specialized guide includes various crafts, videos, virtual tours, book suggestions, and more - <https://guides.mysapl.org/here4u>.

SAPL programming staff also has created the daily "SAPL Daily Challenge." This challenge encourages SAPL followers to participate in challenges such as artistic or creative prompts and tag @mysapl in their posts. "SAPL is Here for You!" and the "SAPL Daily Challenge" initiatives are just two ways in which SAPL has been working to stay connected with the community while we cannot be together in person.

Although we are experiencing a challenging time, we will get through this crisis together. I have engaged my team in discussions about next steps to emerge from this challenge as a stronger Library system with a closer connection to our community. I will share more with you as we know more.


## Remembering Our Good Friend Bruce Gill

Many of the Friends seem to embrace volunteerism wholeheartedly as a "second career," and **Bruce Gill**, who passed away on March 13, 2020, was a model of that giving soul. After retirement from the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (1994), and subsequently from the Round Rock Housing Authority (2001), Bruce volunteered for Northeast Senior Assistance, mentored kids at Larkspur Elementary, worked with Meals on Wheels, and was an active member of St. Thomas Episcopal Church. Bruce's

long list of contributions to the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library included leadership roles with the "big Friends' board," Brook Hollow Friends, Encino Friends, and regular work shifts in the BookCellar over many years.

As **Ronnie Retzloff** noted, "Bruce was a remarkable man. Our paths crossed a number of times other than just with the Friends. ## Wynemah Jean Ivy Durnell

**Wynemah Jean Ivy Durnell** (also known as **Ivy Durnell**) was living proof that good things come in small packages because, even though she was a tiny lady, she had a big personality. She was born in Kaw City, Oklahoma. The youngest of eight children, she was named by her brothers. Her family soon moved to the then new “oil-boom” town of Iraan, Texas. There they lived in a tent city until houses could be built. Ivy played the violin from age five. She studied in the El Paso Conservatory of Music and in Germany. As an adult, she played violin in the El Paso Symphony.

Ivy worked for Civil Service at Fourth and Fifth U.S. Army Headquarters and at Health Services Command. This 31-year career took her to Heidelberg, Germany, Salzburg, Austria, and Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio. As a Manpower Surveyer, she traveled with a team of MSC nurses and civilians determining manpower needed for all Army Hospitals in the United States and Hawaii.

After retiring in 1982, Ivy and her husband **Gilbert Durnell** were the owners of the Northern Hills Fine Arts Gallery where they displayed and sold paintings by many well-known artists.

Ivy was a long-time member and past president of the Thousand Oaks Branch Library Friends and a charter member of the Semmes Branch Friends. In 2009, she was honored as a “Best Friend” by her fellow members. She excelled in planning events for the libraries and in helping decorate for holidays.



When the Friends had book sales, Ivy enjoyed encouraging all library visitors to come in to the meeting room to buy books. At Christmas, she dressed in her Santa suit and strolled around the library playing carols on her violin. When she was no longer able to come, people would ask, “Where’s the little lady?”

In her book *A Wink and a Nod*, Ivy made the following statement to be printed at her death: “At the end of my rainbow, I shall say life has been interesting and worth it all. Please know I shall miss my loving family and friends on this earth. You are all invited to join me in the better life we believe is in Heaven. I will be the one wearing a hat and playing my quarter size violin. Do not cry for me, I lived a wonderful life and found retirement worth it all.”

Ivy’s husband, **Gill Durnell**, preceded her in death. She is survived by her daughter, **Cecilia Ann**, son-in-law, **Bill Dewberry**, and grandchildren **Kristeena Dewberry**, **Asher Dewberry**, **Kimberlee Cook**, **Delaney Cook**, and **Dylan Cook**; and many nieces and nephews.

Want something posted? Send a message to the page or email Karin with the information and any graphics/images you want included. Send as soon as possible – the more time it is posted, the more time people have to see it. Messages received will be posted to the page within 48 hours unless otherwise specified in the message. Information can be scheduled to

post at a future date. So a “reminder” or repost can be scheduled for a few days before the event to remind potential attendees. Post a variety of things: images, articles, animations, and/or graphics/GIFs (Graphics Interchange Format). Grammar, spelling, and punctuation matter!

Hashtag: #: ex #BookCellar: Hashtags turn topics/phrases into clickable links in your posts on your timeline or page. This helps people find posts about topics they're interested in. To make a hashtag, write # (the number/pound sign) along with a topic or phrase and add it to your post. No spaces or punctuation within the item to be “hashtagged”: Alpha/numeric only. Tag: ex @Name: If you tag a friend in your status update, anyone who sees that update can click on your friend’s name and go to their profile. Your status update may also show up on that friend’s timeline. When you tag someone, they’ll be notified.

Going “Live” video posts the video in real-time and allows comments to be seen by poster as they are made. It is a great way to share information and allows viewers to ask questions (and get answers) in real-time.


